## Portobello Timebank AGM 2023

# **Chair's Report**

This is the first year that Timebank has been able to get back to full in-person activities after the Covid episode. It happily coincided with our 10th anniversary, so there has been a lot to celebrate.

# Membership

Timebank membership is very healthy. We have **had 29 new members** join since the last AGM. This brings the total **membership up to 216**. Many new members have attended **induction evenings** with Richard and Christine: a total of **18 inductions** have been held over the past 13 months. Inductions are also open to existing members who might feel they need a refresher.

We extend an especially warm welcome to any new members here tonight, and hope that you will find Timebank a useful resource and an opportunity to get involved in your community.

#### The Committee

The committee has **met monthly** (with a break over the summer) to discuss Timebank development, work on the members' survey and its results, plan events and review what has been achieved.

The committee currently has **6 members**, including the chair, secretary and treasurer, plus three ordinary members. I would like to take this opportunity to thank them all for the many hours of work they have put into the Timebank this year, for all the ideas they have produced and for their helpful, positive and often humorous contributions at meetings.

### **Activities**

Timebank's activities have been many and varied over the last year. We have held:

- 3 talks in Bellfield: bees, early days of the BBC, Scotland's rainforest all these
  have been well attended and also provided a chance for networking over coffee and
  cake
- 3 major litter cleans: November around Windsor Place, Jan in Magdalene Glen, Feb downriver along the Brunstane Burn
- **5 craftalong sessions**: notebooks, Christmas wreaths, painting papier-máche pots, sewing eye pillows, pop-up cards

- A few pub meet-ups in the evening which have proved popular with those not free to socialise during daytime.
- Birdwatching: Botanics, Musselburgh lagoons, Figgate park, Bawsinch, Aberlady
   Bay
- Gardening at Morton Street Triangle, Figgate Lane and Portobello High School

#### **Our Events:**

- Carol singing in December
- Open committee meeting January
- 10th anniversary tea party with tombola, games, tool sharpening and plant sales in April

#### Help with other's events:

- An equinox bonfire on the beach
- Porty stonefest
- Providing the refreshments for the Northfield and Willowbrae environment fair in September

Donations were taken at the talks (towards cost of venue hire), during carol singing (proceeds to Social Bite), at our spring coffee afternoon (50% given to charity, half to DEC and half to Rock Trust) and at the Environment Fair (75% of takings to charity).

# Timebank development

The committee set itself some **goals** to assess how well we had managed to recover.

#### SMART goals:

- 1) return to 2019 levels of transactions in terms of number of hours and
- 2) convert 30% of non-active members into active members

We've got some statistics comparing 2019 (before the lockdowns) to 2023 (to date):

## 1a) First, the **1:1 swaps on hOurworld**.

So far this year, there have been fewer hours logged than in 2019 (60.4%), but given that this is only  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the year, we might reach the target of achieving the same hours as 4 years ago by the end of 2023.


## 1b) Second, the **community project hours**.

These have increased markedly compared to 2019, with 50% more hours so far this year. The increase in community project hours could be an indication of all the wonderful work that other groups do in Portobello, as you can claim hours for voluntary work done elsewhere, e.g. the Bellfield Friday Cafe, the Porty Fridge, etc.

Overall (1:1 and community hours) we have already reached over 90% of the hours done in 2019, so it is clear that we are well on the road to recovery.

# **Timebank Survey**

The **survey** was developed as a follow-on from the ideas generated at **last year's AGM** and was sent out to members in the **autumn**. The **results were collated in the new year** and we have been **working on the feedback**.

There was a common theme on **publicity**, which we are working on. We have been on the front page of the Porty Reporter, and are trying to do more on social media. However, this is something for which we **really need extra help on the committee**. The **newsletter** got really good feedback in the survey, and we have taken on the plea to include more photos.

There was also a common theme of Timebankers wanting **more opportunities to meet** other Timebankers. We have tried to create these opportunities, by e.g. having more socialising time at the talks, and by introducing the pub nights, which have become very popular. The speed networking later this evening also comes under this heading!

Social events: daytime meet-up for coffee	We have occasional meet-ups as part of the Bellfield café on a Friday morning, however attendance is low, so maybe this is not a priority.	
Events: Litter picking events are very popular	We will have more of these starting soon, once ground vegetation has died back and we can see all the litter again!	
Community gardening	Josephine heads up the gardening and says: We have an amazing gardening team who have transformed Morton Street triangle, Figgate Lane and more recently the garden in Portobello High School. The community/guerilla gardening is a great example of commitment, dedication, consistency and creativity. Plants have been generously donated by multiple Portobello residents and adorn these hitherto neglected spaces. Benches have been repaired and painted and this has been rewarded by children's parties and live music playing in Morton street. The beauty of the plants and the tranquility of the space has created a delightful community space. Figgate Lane which was very neglected and had attracted a lot of rubbish is now a verdant space with currant bushes, herbs, architectural artichokes and multiple other plants. The school garden is a work in progress. On Friday October 6th an incredible team of 8 volunteers transformed the space and planted a number of sensory plants. The proposal is to develop a sensory garden and Timebank has generously offered to fund some plants to enable this to happen.
